And second, we'll be starting our Second Sunday Sampler program this month (see below), which means we will now have a Social Justice Interest Group that will, among other things, take charge of regular contributions to the Food Shelf.

Please bring a few spring flowers or a small branch of leaves, flowers, or buds for our Easter Sunday celebration, along with your items for the food hunt, and we'll reflect together on Easter and creativity and all things new.

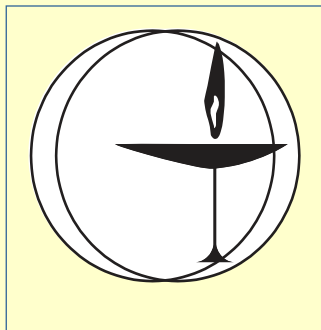
Second Sunday Samplers Begin

On Sunday morning April 11th we will hold our very first Second Sunday Sampler. We will meet at the usual time (10 a.m.) and place, but instead of holding a worship service we will have various small groups. Right now, two groups are planned, and child care will be available, provided by Bonnie Beiswenger and Matt O'Donnell.

The two groups starting up are a Social Justice Interest Group and an adult religious education class. Rev. Peggy Meeker will lead the class, with a session from "What Moves Us," which invites participants to engage with some of the major theological perspectives of our tradition and to test them against our own life experience. For the Social Justice group, David Markham will lead a discussion on "Nonviolent approaches to peace-making, peacebuilding, and peacekeeping," touching on anger management, cultural support for conflict resolution, and the relevance of nonviolence in today's world. CROP Walk—Sunday May 2nd



The 28th Brockport CROP (Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty) Walk will take place on Sunday, May 2. This year's host church is the Brockport United Methodist Church. CROP Walkers collect pledges from supporters, with 25% of the money going to the Brockport Food Shelf. Last year 123 walkers raised \$12,904, with \$3,226 going to the Brockport Food Shelf. The goal this year is to have 150 walkers raise \$15,000—which would mean an average of \$100 in pledges for each walker.

The first CROP Walk in the US took place on October 17, 1969 in Bismarck, ND, with 1,000 walkers hiking 25 miles and raising \$25,000. Today there are over 2,000 CROP Walks each year throughout the nation. The funds raised support both local and worldwide programs that meet emergency needs and also address the root causes of poverty.

This year's Brockport CROP Walk will start at the Brockport United Methodist Church (at 92 Main Street) with registration at 12:30 and the 10 Kilometer (6.2 mile) Walk beginning at 1:00.
